



My excitement knew no bounds ! !

I was thrilled to see my name in print in the NJH Jaundice issue so unexpected and happened so casually. When Dr Vishpala, came to Palghar, she told me to locate the Hep B case of Dr Dilip Dixit. When she got it in her hand, she saw I was the primary physician to take the case. So she told me, "sit down and write out the details of the case on the computer and email it to me." I was apprehensive but she helped me to edit and finalize. That night I sat and wrote till 2 am and mailed it to her. The same day, I got the corrected copy back, asking for some other inputs. Thus it traveled back and forth 3-4 times till finally it came in print, I could not believe that the article looked so nice. Very kindly she put my name along with Dr Dixit's in the author box. When the issue went to my college in my hometown and my professors saw it, they all praised me. It was so thrilling.

That moment I recalled my thrill when I saw Homoeopathy work for the first time. I want to share that experience of my internship period, when I was a novice and did not know much about Homoeopathy. My first internship posting was in surgery. I was so upset because that I couldn't see a drop of blood without getting severe giddiness & fainting for 30 to 40 mins. There was a well-known homoeopath, Dr K M Bhojar practicing in Nanded. I went to him. He gave me some

powders- just take 3 to 4 doses of this medicine & you will be all right. But I couldn't believe this because I did not have much faith in Homoeopathy.. Still I took those 4 doses on subsequent days. On 5th day I went for my first surgical posting- an appendicectomy operation. Our surgeon was very strict - he would tell all students who get giddiness in the OT "you are not fit to be a doctor"! So I was very frightened. The operation started. Sir had opened the abdomen, I was looking at it but not fainting! I couldn't believe myself! To confirm I shook my neck; the surgeon scolded me- Is something wrong? Then I told about my problem of giddiness after seeing blood.

Later I went back to that Sir & told him "Sir, you are so great." He told me "I am not great, 'HOMOEOPATHY' is great." Since then I have become a staunch Homoeopath. I started practicing with him. At the end of 6 months, he told me, Anil, it is better to go to such an institute where you can learn classical and scientific Homoeopathy. That is how I came to ICR. I have been here for 2 years and my faith in Homeopathy is now firmly entrenched.

These are 2 greatest experiences of my life, which to-day I felt emboldened to share with you.
